JULIET HART (Emily Penrose) is a founding Company Member of TimeLine, where she has appeared in OSLO, A DISAPPEARING NUMBER, THE APPLE FAMILY PLAYS: THAT HOPEY CHANGEY THING and SORRY (Jeff Award nomination – Ensemble), 33 VARIA-

TIONS (Jeff Award – Production, Play, Midsize), TO MASTER THE ART, ALL MY SONS, WEEKEND, HARMLESS, MARTIN FUREY'S SHOT, IT'S ALL TRUE (Jeff Award nomination – Supporting Actress), and many others. Other Chicago credits include work with Chicago Shakespeare, Prop Thtr, Zebra Crossing, and Collaboraction. Television credits include CHICAGO FIRE and PROVEN INNOCENT. Film credits include ONE YEAR LATER, written and directed by Chicago's own Lucia Mauro. Juliet joyfully serves as Director of TimeLine's Living History Education Program, where she finds inspiration every day working with CPS students and teachers. She holds an MFA degree in Acting from The Theatre School at DePaul University and is represented by Gray Talent Group.



PJ POWERS (John D'Agata, TimeLine Artistic Director) was a co-founder of TimeLine in 1997 and became Artistic Director in 1999. He is delighted to return to the stage for this production, having previously appeared in 18 productions at TimeLine. most recently in

THE APPLE FAMILY PLAYS: THAT HOPEY CHANGEY THING and THE FRONT PAGE. Other TimeLine credits include THE FARNSWORTH INVENTION, FIORELLO!, ALL MY SONS, HAUPTMANN, NOT ABOUT NIGHTINGALES, and GASLIGHT, among others, and he directed the Chicago premiere of J.T. Rogers' ONE GIANT LEAP: THE APOLLO 11 MOON LANDING in a one-night TimeLine event at the Broadway Playhouse. He has also appeared at Writers, Northlight, and Shattered Globe, among others. As Artistic Director, he has overseen the production of more than 85 plays, including 13 world premieres and 40 Chicago premieres. During his tenure, TimeLine has garnered 60 Jeff Awards, including 11 for Outstanding Production, as well as awards for excellence in arts management, including the 2016 MacArthur Award for Creative and Effective Institutions, PJ was instrumental in establishing TimeLine's longtime home

on Wellington Avenue in 1999; expanding the company's programming to include productions in numerous other venues, including the Broadway Playhouse; creating the TimePieces play reading series and First Draft Festival of new work; launching the Living History Education Program in Chicago Public Schools under the direction of TimeLine co-founder Juliet Hart; and planning for Time-Line's new home in Uptown. A graduate of The Theatre School at DePaul University, PJ has served on the Board of Directors for the League of Chicago Theatres and received a Goldman Sachs Senior Fellowship at the Smithsonian National Museum of American History. JEREMY KAREKEN (Playwright) is a playwright living in New York and Baltimore. His short plays HOT ROD, BIG TRAIN, and 80 CARDS have been performed around the country and internationally. He served as a speech writer and policy analyst for two presidential campaigns. His awards include the Sewanee Conference's Dakin Fellowship for FARBLONDJET, and Guthrie/Playwrights Center's Two-Headed Challenge for THE SWEET SWEET MOTHER-HOOD. The Hamptons Film Festival Screenwriters Conference selected Kareken and David Murrell for their horrorcomedy script about haunted breast implants-THESE! CONQUERED THE EARTH. In 2018, PlayPenn shortlisted Kareken's new political satire about an illiterate king, THE RED WOOL. Born and raised in Rochester, New York, and a graduate of the University of Chicago, he has taught at NYU, NYIT, the Actors Studio Drama School, and currently teaches at The Acting Studio - New York. A lifetime member of The Actors Studio, Kareken occasionally acts and for 18 years served as the researcher for Bravo TV's INSIDE THE ACTORS STUDIO.

DAVID MURRELL (*Playwright*) was born and raised in New York City. He graduated from Stuyvesant High School and the University of Chicago, currently lives in Queens, and has written a sea chest's worth of TV and film treatments and spec scripts. Access Theater (NYC) and the Cleveland Public Theatre each produced his play DUCTWORK, and the Hamptons Film Festival Screenwriters Conference selected his and Jeremy Kareken's feature screenplay about haunted breast implants, THESE! CON-QUERED THE EARTH. In 2019, the Outer Critics Circle coawarded Murrell its John Gassner Playwriting Award for THE LIFESPAN OF A FACT.

GORDON FARRELL (Playwright) trained as a playwright at the Yale School of Drama, receiving an MFA in 1986 and going on to work with major Hollywood studios, initially as a story analyst for Warner Brothers and Columbia Pictures, and eventually as a screenwriter. He has written for hire and sold screenplays to Universal Pictures. Warner Brothers, MGM, and ITC. Farrell's first independent screenplay, GIRLS WHO SMOKE, premiered in 2011. It went on to be an official selection at more than a dozen film festivals, receiving the Audience Choice Award at Seattle's Post Alley Film Festival. As a playwright, from 2009 to 2013, Gordon worked with dozens of women on New York's Lower East Side who wanted to tell their personal stories on stage. The series of monologue plays that grew out of it was called IN THE RED ROOM/EVERY WOMAN DANCES FOR SOMEONE. His other plays have been produced in San Francisco, and at Alleyway Theatre, the Yale School of Drama, and New York's Primary Stages. He is the author of THE POWER OF THE PLAYWRIGHT'S VISION, published by Heinemann Press in 2001. It has been translated internationally and become a standard playwriting text at colleges and universities in North America, Europe, and Asia.

JOHN D'AGATA (Author) is the author of Halls of Fame, About a Mountain, and The Lifespan of a Fact (with Jim Fingal), as well as the editor of the 3-volume series A New History of the Essay, which includes the anthologies The Next American Essay, The Making of the American Essay, and The Lost Origins of the Essay. His work has been supported by a Guggenheim Fellowship, a Howard Foundation Fellowship, an NEA Literature Fellowship, and a Lannan Foundation Fellowship. He holds a BA degree from Hobart College and two MFA degrees from the University of Iowa, and recently his essays have appeared in The Believer, Harper's, Gulf Coast, and Conjunctions. D'Agata lives in Iowa City, where he teaches creative writing at the University of Iowa.

JIM FINGAL (*Author*) is co-writer of *The Lifespan of a Fact* (with John D'Agata) and the cofounder of *Logic* magazine, a print magazine about technology. He is the past Chief Technology Officer and now Principal Engineer and Chief Architect at Amino, whose mission is to create the clearest picture of the American healthcare system and connect everyone with the best care possible. He holds an AB degree in English and American Literature and Language from Harvard University.

MECHELLE MOE (Director) is a Company Member at Time-Line, where her credits include directing RUTHERFORD AND SON, CARDBOARD PIANO and IN THE NEXT ROOM, OR THE VIBRATOR PLAY. JEFFREY D. KMIEC (Scenic Designer) returns to Time-Line, where he previously designed OSLO, CARDBOARD PIANO, THE AUDIENCE, and BAKERSFIELD MIST. Jeffrey is an award-winning New York-based production designer for theatre and television. MICA COLE (*Executive Director*) was named TimeLine's Executive Director in April 2022. A Chicago native raised on the South Side, she has worked as an arts administrator and changemaker for nearly two decades. Most recently, she has been a national consultant providing executive coaching and strategic planning for cultural institutions working to embrace an antiracist leadership paradigm. Mica is a consultant with artEquity, a nonprofit organization that provides tools, training, and resources for individuals and organizations working at the intersection of art and activism. She co-led its BIPOC Surviving Predominantly White Institutions Series and the BIPOC Leadership Circle-both aimed at providing resources and mentorship to leaders of color. Prior to her work as an organizational consultant, Mica served eight seasons as the Repertory Producer at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival. As a senior leader at OSF, she played a key role in guiding the company's equity, diversity, and inclusion initiatives, many of which now serve as foundational organizational models for institutions around the world. Mica has produced more than 80 shows, including a dozen transfers and national co-productions of new plays with theatres such as American Repertory, Seattle Repertory, South Coast Rep, Arena Stage, Portland Center Stage, and Berkeley Repertory. She worked in Chicago as the Executive Director of Free Street Theater and as the Director of Education and Engagement at Writers Theatre. Mica served on the advisory committee for the Latinx Theatre Commons and is a founding member of the Black Theatre Commons. She is a graduate of The Theatre School at DePaul University.

From the moment in 1997 that six founders each pitched in \$50 to launch this company, TimeLine has worked to become one of Chicago's leading cultural institutions by creating theatre that is more than just a few hours in a seat. Our team of Company Members works collaboratively to present riveting stories that link our past, present, and future—exploring today's social and political issues through the lens of the past and inspiring ourselves to re-imagine tomorrow.

It is a mission unique in Chicago, and beyond.

Now celebrating our 27th season, TimeLine has presented 89 productions, including 13 world premieres and 40 Chicago premieres.

Our work has been recognized in Chicago and beyond: TimeLine received the prestigious 2016 MacArthur Award for Creative and Effective Institutions and has been named "Company of the Year" in *The Wall Street Journal* (2010), one of the American Theatre Wing's top 10 emerging professional theatre companies nationwide (2011) and *Chicago* magazine's "Best Theatre" in the city (2011). And we have been honored with 60 Jeff Awards, including an award for Outstanding

We work to match artistic excellence with sophisticated business management, and these efforts also have been recognized. TimeLine was the first arts organization to receive the Alford-Axelson Award for Nonprofit Managerial Excellence of a small company, and we have received the Association for Strategic Planning's Richard Goodman Strategic Planning Award in the Non-Profit category.

LIVING HISTORY PROGRAM

Learning and discovery have always been central to TimeLine's mission, driven by our belief that live performance can connect people and illuminate ideas.

Founded in 2006, TimeLine's Living History Education Program brings that mission to Chicago Public Schools, working with students on creative exercises related to historically inspired stories on TimeLine's stage and beyond.

Living History is an arts integration residency that features

curriculum designed to teach theatre skills while fostering the capacity to think creatively, to make connections, and to provide new ways of understanding history and the world around us. Over six to 13 sessions, students explore connections between history, art, and their own lives, developing critical thinking and communication skills.

"It made me feel that I was part of that moment in history. As if I was experiencing it firsthand. It made me understand it better."

During Living History residencies, TimeLine teaching artists and classroom teachers collaborate on lesson plans that illuminate the themes of the play and their connection to each classroom curriculum. Students work on several scenes from a TimeLine production and are provided with a study guide. They experience visits from the production's actors and dramaturg and attend a student matinee and post-show discussion with the cast.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Living History revisioned its play- and field trip-centered residencies to respond to the unique needs of students and teachers who are living through history and looking for ways to express their experiences. The need for partnership, collaboration, and creative problem-solving is more important than ever, and Living History has provided virtual and real-time opportunities to use theater-based exercises to amplify student voices, challenges, hopes, and dreams.

Since its inception, more than 9,000 students have actively explored history through Living History. TimeLine currently partners with nine schools to present the program.

TimeLine South—a unique arts program that provides teens a safe space for self-expression, creativity, and ensemble building on the south side of Chicago—just celebrated its 6th anniversary, and two years in partnership with the Reva and David Logan Center for the Arts. Offered free of charge for six weeks during the summer, TimeLine South promotes leadership in the arts and introduces teens to the idea that theatre can also be a vehicle for social justice.
